Programme title: Bachelor of Science in Nursing

Applicable student cohort(s): 2025-26 and thereafter

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing [BSc(Nurs)] is a full-time, four-year (including three summer semesters), self-financed degree programme tailored primarily for students from mainland China. This programme is designed to develop professional nurse leaders endowed with global perspectives and competencies necessary to provide high-quality healthcare services in mainland China and, eventually, in Hong Kong. Upon successful completion, graduates are well-prepared and eligible to sit for the National Nursing Licensure Examination (NNLE) in mainland China, which qualifies them to become registered nurses and embark on a fulfilling and promising career in healthcare.

Course types and assessments:

The programme consists of different types of courses which are taught using distinctive learning modes. The majority of courses are 6-credit units, but there are also 12-credit and 30-credit courses. Following the recommendation from the University, 150 hours of student learning activity (including both contact hours and all other forms of student learning activity) is used as the norm for a 6-credit course. However, the contact hours and output requirements for different groups of courses vary according to the learning modes employed. For 12-credit and 30-credit courses, 320 hours and 760 hours of student learning activity are required respectively for clinical practicum courses.

Students are also required to take the NNLE Immersion preparation courses (non-credit bearing). Students are assessed for each course, and assessments may be conducted using one or a combination of written tests or examinations, continuous assessment of performance, field work or project reports.

There are 5 categories of courses in this programme, as outlined below:

1. Survey Courses (6 credits per course)

These courses focus on content, including nursing theories.

2. Laboratory Courses (6 credits per course)

These courses provide opportunities for students to observe and practise clinical skills essential for clinical settings with the application of the nursing knowledge acquired in the classroom.

3. Workshop, Group Learning and Project-based Courses (6 credits per course)

These courses are designed to enhance students' critical thinking and facilitate collaboration among group members. Students are able to reinforce their understanding of nursing theories through group discussion and project presentation on a particular topic related to the course.

4. Clinical Practicum Courses (12 and 30 credits)

These practica aim at providing clinical experiences for students to apply knowledge of the nursing process, communication, problem-solving and decision-making skills in various medical, surgical and specialty settings.

Primarily practical and hands-on experiences in clinical settings

• Assessment methods and tasks

Continuous clinical assessment (100%) by supervisors according to the objectives or the assessment criteria as listed in the Nursing Practicum Assessment Journal (NPAJ). Students are expected to achieve and fulfil the essential and specific learning objectives in each practicum, and their level of clinical competence is recorded properly in the Clinical Practicum Journal. These objectives are related to knowledge, attitudes and skills applicable to the setting of nursing practice. Comments on students' performance will also be recorded in this Journal.
